Ag Workforce Coalition Leaders Discuss Immigration Reform Proposal for American Agriculture

Washington, D.C. (April 16, 2013)—Leaders from the Agriculture Workforce Coalition (AWC) will be joined this afternoon by United Farm Workers President Arturo Rodriguez at a press conference to highlight the crucial stake American agriculture has in immigration reform. Late last week, a landmark agreement on immigration reform was reached by the AWC, the UFW and key Senators. Provisions based on this agreement form an integral part of the Senate's comprehensive immigration package, introduced early this morning.

Representing a broad cross-section of agriculture, the AWC members will emphasize why it's important for immigration legislation to include framework and objectives to ensure America's farmers, ranchers and growers have access to a secure and stable workforce now and in the future.
